On December 10, 1971, Albert, accompanied by Michael Drobenare, a leader of May Day Collective (MDC) and Peoples Coalition For Peace and Justice (PCPJ), departed NYC en route to Ann Arbor, Michigan. Albert and Drobenare possibly traveled in a 1968 gold Chevrolet, bearing New York License 6796 KU, belonging to Drobenare's mother.

The MDC in NYC is publicly known as an organization that participated in demonstrations in Washington, D.C. (WDC) during first week of May, 1971 sponsored by the PCPJ. The MDC in NYC has been inactive since September, 1971.

A PCPJ press release dated March 1, 1971, described the PCPJ as being headquartered in WDC and consisting of over 100 organizations which are using massive, non-violent, civil disobedience to combat racism, poverty, repression and war.

Albert and Michael Drobenare were in WDC for unknown reasons during the week of December 28, 1971. [REDACTED]

Albert and Drobenare are believed to have taken to Ann Arbor, Michigan on December 10, 1971.

The National Peace Action Coalition (NPAC) was founded in 1970 by members of the Socialist Workers Party (SWP). Its basic objective is to unite masses of people including labor unions, GIs, and the black community in the struggle to end United States intervention in Southeast Asia through orderly and peaceful tactics. The SWP has been designated pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

In addition to [REDACTED] MICHAEL DROBENARE, a member of the PCPJ, has arrived in Miami Beach to assist in preparing for PCPJ and MCC cooperation.

The MCC appears to have taken itself out of the picture with regard to planning of demonstrations for the Democratic National Convention in July, 1972. The MCC is attempting to reserve its limited resources for the Republican Convention in August, 1972. The MCC expects to participate in the activities surrounding the Democratic Convention only to the extent of staging a cultural exhibit to be presented in the vicinity of the convention complex during the convention.

MCC AND PCPJ MEETING, JULY 13, 1972

The master plan of the MCC and the PCPJ, as set forth above, was developed through a series of conferences attended by members of the two groups. During the meeting on the evening of July 13, 1972, a lengthy discussion was required to settle differences between the two organizations before any definite plans could be made. During this discussion, the following points were made by some of the 40 people involved in the conference:

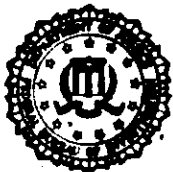
*Yla* JUDY GUMBO said that one of the problems resulting from the influx of PCPJ people shortly before the DNC was that the MCC people had a feeling of participation and equality in the planning of the activities relating to the DNC; however, after the PCPJ arrived on the scene, everyone in MCC immediately was made to feel that they were nothing more than PCPJ staff and they were inferior to the PCPJ leaders. She said that, incredible though it may seem, MCC people quickly became alienated labor within a movement group.

*Yla* MIKE DROBENARE responded to GUMBO by stating that PCPJ came to town only to find everything in a shambles and all PCPJ did was pick up the pieces.

The Miami Conventions Coalition (MCC) was formed at a national meeting in Washington, D.C. on May 20, 1972, as a coalition of groups planning protest activities at the Democratic and Republican National Conventions.

RENNARD DAVIS, also known as RENNIE DAVIS, was found guilty in U.S. District Court, Chicago, Illinois, during February, 1970, of violation of Federal anti-riot laws arising out of his participation in the riots during the Democratic National Convention, Chicago, Illinois, in August, 1968. DAVIS was sentenced but was released on \$25,000 bond by the U.S. Court of Appeals, Chicago.

Sources one and two advised that a meeting of the MCC was held on July 1, 1972, from approximately 2:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. at the MCC headquarters located at 1718 Alton Road in Miami. Apparently, there was some misunderstanding as to whether or not the meeting would be open to representatives of other organizations. Although it was originally intended to be a closed meeting for members of MCC and the Peoples Coalition for Peace and Justice (PCPJ), members from other groups were allowed to remain long enough to state their requests for MCC support.
